

Our Collective Identity

- Contemporary uses of tapa cloth are often creative/artistic, ceremonial, and for giving on special occasions.
 - This activity takes the idea that tapa cloth has a special purpose and, using alternative accessible materials, we will make and decorate our 'tapa' cloth with symbols and imagery important and relevant to us and our collective identity.

Creating our Tapa Cloth

 Step 1: Take a square of brown paper. Scrunch it up. Keep working it with your hands. Unroll it. Rescrunch it. The more 'scrunched' the better.

 Step 2: Take some time to plan what you would like to depict on your square of our tapa cloth. What symbolizes / represents your sense of identity?

Creating our Tapa Cloth

- Step 3: Using a dry iron, carefully iron your scrunched square of brown paper 'flat'.
- Step 4: Create your identity masterpiece. Think about use of colour, words, images, layout, symbolism...
- Step 5: Your square is ready to be added to our collective Tapa Cloth.


Using Language, Symbols and Text


